

What's the expectation of a building safety manager?



Key learnings

Whole system failure underpinned by:

- Ignorance
- Indifference
- Lack of clarity on roles and responsibilities
- Inadequate regulatory oversight and enforcement tools
- [Lack of up to date and accurate information]

All leading to a 'race to the bottom' culture





Dame Hackitt

Key recommendations

- Clear model of risk ownership- defined roles (BSM!) and new regulator
- Simpler and effective outcomes based regulatory framework
- Buildings as a system approach
- Risk-based approach to regulatory oversight- safety case
- Transparency of information and audit trail throughout lifecycle of building
- Culture change through competence based approach formal expectations and certification





Building a Safer Future

The Building a Safer Future consultation from the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government was launched on 6th June 2019, and covers 5 broad areas:





New duty holder regime – the AP and the new statutory BSM during occupation phase

- Proposed new accountable person (AP) legally responsible for ensuring that building safety risks to occupants are reduced insofar as is reasonably practical
- Who is this new Statutory building safety manager (BSM) and what do they do?
 - the building is safely managed with regard to fire and structural risks and
 - <u>promote</u> the openness, trust and collaboration with <u>residents</u> fundamental to keeping buildings safe.
- Regulator will check suitability criteria before agreeing to register BSM:
 - Availability of <u>necessary team and funding</u>
 - Relevant competence, experience and qualifications to undertake functions in compliance with the building safety certificate



Other important newly enshrined concepts

Building safety certificate

- Will identify the AP, the BSM, the building and the obligations/conditions for ensuring the building is safe for residents
- = a registration procedure with operational conditions and competence checks, linked to safety case

Golden thread of information

- Digital format- BIM?
- Key data set in specific format

Safety case

 The AP has to make a case to the building safety regulator demonstrating that hazards have been identified, risks assessed and appropriate mitigation put in place



Other important newly enshrined concepts

- Resident Engagement: the BSM will need to support the AP to:
 - Provide residents with the <u>building and fire safety information</u> they need to understand the protections in place (proactively and reactively)
 - Develop, implement and make available to all residents a <u>Resident</u> <u>Engagement Strategy</u>
 - Provide a clear route of escalation for concerns



- Overseeing the <u>enforcement</u> of a more stringent regulatory regime for buildings in scope of the new regime (register of buildings, guidance for dutyholders, ...)
- Overseeing competence of professions and trades working on buildings
- Overseeing the <u>building safety and wider regulatory system</u> as a whole

Building safety regulator and competence



Building Safety Regulator

- Regulator function (buildings)
- overarching competency body and oversight structure (people)
- registers: competent people and BSMs; buildings and their DH, incl. AP
- shadow body: within existing regulator HSE

National standards/competence framework

- competence standards enshrined in national standards under auspices of national standards body (BSI)
- developed stakeholder led by BSR-appointed standards committee (interim committee until legislation adopted and implemented)



UKAS-approved organisations will deliver competent, certified people

- Register of competent people
- Competence assessment
- CPD
- Code of conduct incl. IWFM



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Specific building safety measures


Both the <u>Grenfell Inquiry Phase 1 report</u> and <u>Advice for Building Owners</u> published by the Expert Panel set up after the tragedy list a number of building safety measures that building owners and manager should be taking forward.

Key areas to consider are:

- Removal of unsafe materials and remediate unsafe wall systems
- Fire risk assessment:
- External wall cladding and fire resistance
- Fire doors (fire resistant and self-closing?)
- Fire fighting facilities, incl. testing of lifts
- Emergency fire procedures:
- Incl. personal evacuation plans
- Provision for evacuation signals

- Smoke control systems
- Keep fire service informed of relevant information and changes:
 - Details of external walls and materials
 - Paper and electronic plans
 - Location of premises information box (equip every high rise building)
- Ensure clearly marked floor levels
